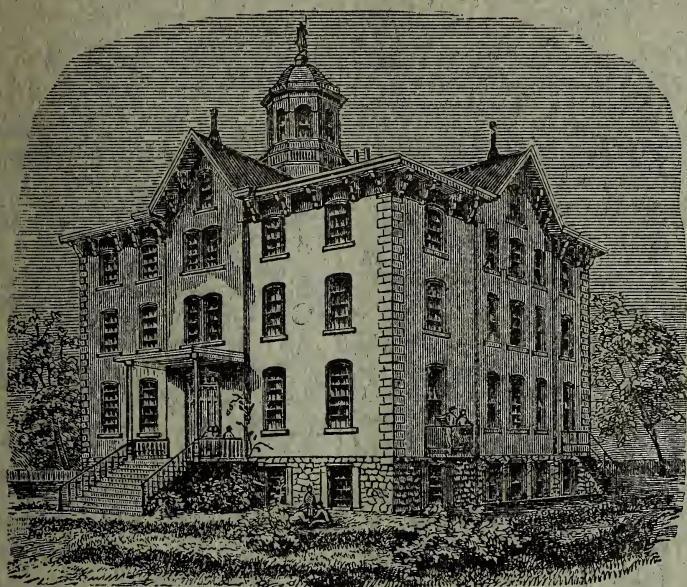

35th ANNUAL REPORT

— OF THE —

ORPHAN'S HOME AND ASYLUM FOR AGED AND INFIRM

— OF THE —

EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH,

GERMANTOWN, PHIL'A, PA.

These Institutions of our Church have now rounded out thirty-five years of their existence.

From the day the first child was received into the fostering care of the Church, March 12, 1859, the work assumed greater proportions and deepening interest which necessitated arrangements for accommodations far beyond what the first Home, in an unpretentious dwelling on Main Street, Germantown, could afford. On April 29, 1862, the corner stone of what is now called the Old Building was laid; the building itself rapidly finished, and ample accommodations provided for all those seeking shelter and care under its roof. Our Home promptly opened its doors to receive the Soldier Orphans in 1864; no less than 98 being consigned to its care by the State Superintendent. This large number forced the managers to secure a larger building; and on July 24, 1865, the corner stone of the present orphanage was laid, and the building rapidly completed.

Since 1859 no less than 600 children have found asylum in our Home, 379 boys and 221 girls, of which number 52 boys and 46 girls were Soldier's orphans. Up to the present date 334 boys and 199 girls have been removed, being received into christian families or returned to their mothers or guardians—and 20 children, 11 boys and 9 girls have been removed by death.—This percentage is very small when we consider that these children are received from homes of neglect often no less than of poverty, and they bring with them diseases and infirmities inherited from parents, and even resulting from severity and neglect.

During the past year 10 boys and 4 girls were admitted to the Home—and 7 boys and 6 girls were returned to their parents. Though there has been considerable sickness off and on among the children, yet, we are grateful to say that no serious results have followed and the present health of the children is very good. There are at present in the Home 45 boys and 22 girls, making a total of 67.

Under the conscientious and painstaking management of the Superintendent and his wife the children have been well cared for, the dis-

cipline of the Home has been improved, the intellectual and spiritual interests of all the inmates ably conserved and the general good of the institutions constantly secured.

The financial condition of the Home and Asylum, especially during this year of business stringency and financial depression, demands our grateful acknowledgment of God's faithfulness toward His needy and helpless children, as also our honest appreciation of the diligence and care of the Superintendent, President and Treasurer.

In June, 1893, Miss A. Rott entered as assistant to the matron of the Home. In July 1893, Miss Gertrude Metzenthin entered the Home as teacher of the Kindergarten. During the past summer and until the end of February, 1894, Mr. Paul Metzenthin, a student of our Theological Seminary, has rendered valuable services as tutor over the boys of the Home.

The every-day instruction of the children is persecuted in both the German and the English languages by two competent and faithful teachers. The pastor of the Institutions imparts the religious instruction in Catechism and Biblical History. Worship is conducted once in English and once in German every day. Divine services in German and English are held regularly on the Lord's day in the chapel with the children and old people; and the children confirmed when old enough.

During the year the Board had the old and dangerous heating arrangement taken out of the Orphanage and a steam-heating apparatus with complete coils and radiators put in, thus removing the stoves from the building, affording better comfort and satisfaction; have secured swings and gymnastic apparatus for the children and have fitted up the first floor of the old building as an industrial department, thus enabling the boys to usefully occupy their spare time, and the Superintendent to test and gauge the mechanical ability and disposition of the boys.

The care of those, who had become enfeebled by years and were without the help and protection of others, was part of the original plan of the Orphan's Home. The first building, into which the first child was received in 1859, opened its door for the admission of the first person into the Asylum,—May 10, 1860.—The present building was erected in 1880—and up to this present date 125 persons, 23

men and 102 women have been admitted to the Asylum. Of this number 97 have died and 24 have left or were taken to the homes of friends.

There have been admitted to the Asylum during the past year 2 men and 3 women, making a total of 28 in the Asylum to-day.— Applications for admission have been left unanswered since the building is full in every part.

This constrained the Board to enter into a contract for the completion of the third story, main and back buildings, making a boys' dormitory for the present of the space over the chapel, and single apartments of the main building for the use of the aged.—This work is expected to be furnished and ready for use about the 1st of May.— The heating and sanitary arrangements have undergone extensive alterations and repairs.—There has been considerable sickness in the Asylum during the past winter, as the number of deaths show. Under the matronly care of Mrs. Pietzsch the old people appear comfortable and contented, and the Asylum is made inviting and restful to these souls, whose day is fast hastening to its setting, and for whose comfort no effort is spared.

The labor and anxiety which the care and responsibility of these Institutions impose on the Board, and especially on the Superintendent, are heavy and incessant. — But a willing hand has always been held out by the Lady Visitors, whose interest never flags, whose tender concern for the orphan and the aged is ever strong and prompt, and whose energies and activities even in the face of disappointments and difficulties, are quick to seize upon necessities and compass gratifying results. Our Ladies are deserving of lavish praise and unstinted thanks for their indefatigable labors of christian love and benevolence.

Though the income of this year has not been up to the expectations and demands, for well-known reasons of scarcity in work and wages, the churches have done goodly work in sending in donations and thus helping to keep down the cash expenditures ; for which we desire herewith to give public expression of thanks.

Special sonstraint however, is laid upon the Board to voice its deepest gratitude towards the kind friends who have so generously remembered our institutions by will and bequest. We feel grateful for these proofs of renewed confidence in the management of these institutions of the church's benevolence on the part of our people — and we call special attention to these gifts in the Trea-

surer's Report — and herewith extend our hearty appreciation and thanks, in the name of the Institution and the church, to these kind friends and their families.

The German Hospital, Phila., has on several occasions kindly received for special and successful treatment cases sent to it. — The care and attention given our patients within its walls call for public recognition and special thanks.

Dr. George Friebs, 1720 Chestnut St., Phila., has rendered most acceptable and efficient services as ophthalmologist in the Home and Asylum, sparing neither time nor attention for the relief and comfort of the patients.

W. H. Staake, Esq., has given most valuable services to the Institutions in promptly aiding the Board in their efforts to straighten out and settle up such matters as needed legal advice and guidance; and, as these occasions have been of frequent and protracted occurrence, the Board desires thus publicly to express its gratitude.

Donation day was held June 8th 1893, and was an occasion worthy, in every way, of the able and successful endeavors of our Lady Visitors and Churches. June 14th has been fixed as the Donation Day for this year.

April 27th the annual Examination of the school took place; and the Anniversary will be celebrated in St. John's Church, Race above 5th Sts., Rev. E. E. Sibole, pastor, April 29th at 3 P. M. Confirmation will take place in the chapel of our Institution on Ascension Day, May 3rd, at 3 P. M.

When we remember the thousands who have clamored for food and clothing and fuel, and consider the condition of our orphans and Infirm, with food and raiment sufficient for them, comfortable rooms and beds, constant care and training, and freed of every fear and anxiety, we have abundant reason to thank our Heavenly Father, and under Him, the christian hearts and hands, for every mercy and blessing, trusting the same kind providence to provide the necessary means, from the abundance of His faithful people, to care for the needs of these helpless souls, whom Christ has purchased with His blood and whom He commands His Church to keep and feed.

The Superintendent now meets regularly with the Board. No bills are paid except vouched for and orders are properly drawn by the Finance Committee. The Treasurer submits monthly reports — and all books, papers of value, accounts etc. are annually audited by persons outside the Board.

The term of service of H. Lehman, H. S. Cassel and Rev. F. P. Bender expires with the next meeting of the Ministerium.

35. Jahresbericht

des Waisenhauses und Alten-Asyls der Evang.-
Luth. Kirche, Germantown, Philadelphia, Pa.

Diese Anstalten unserer Kirche haben nun 35 Jahre ihres Bestehens zurückgelegt. Seit dem Tage, da das erste Kind in unsere Obhut aufgenommen wurde, am 12. März 1859, hat sich das Werk immer weiter ausgedehnt. Das erste unscheinbare Gebäude an der Hauptstraße Germantowns genügte bald den Anforderungen nicht mehr, und bedeutende Erweiterungen mußten gemacht werden. So wurde am 29. April 1862 der Eckstein zu einem größeren Gebäude — dem jetzigen „alten Gebäude“ (Werkstätte). — gelegt, und dasselbe auch bald vollendet und mit allem Notwendigen ausgestattet, um den unter seinem Dache Schutz und Schirm Suchenden eine Heimat zu werden. Die Zahl derselben vermehrte sich bedeutend, als im Jahre 1864 nicht weniger als 98 Waisen unserer gefallenen Soldaten in die Anstalt aufgenommen wurden. Hierdurch wurden die Verwalter der Anstalt genötigt, das dritte Gebäude zu errichten. Am 24. Juli 1865 wurde der Eckstein zu dem jetzigen Hauptgebäude (Waisenhaus) gelegt und dasselbe auch bald vollendet.

Seit dem Jahre 1859 fanden bereits 600 Kinder, 379 Knaben und 221 Mädchen Aufnahme in unserem Waisenhaus, von denen 52 Knaben und 46 Mädchen Soldatenwaisen waren. 334 Knaben und 199 Mädchen verließen die Anstalt, um in christlichen Familien ein Unterkommen zu finden oder ihren Müttern oder Vormündern wieder zugestellt zu werden; und 20 Kinder — 11 Knaben und 9 Mädchen — sind durch den Tod weggenommen worden. Dies ist verhältnismäßig ein sehr kleiner Prozentsatz, wenn wir in Betracht ziehen, daß ein großer Teil dieser Kinder aus Häusern nicht nur der Armut, sondern auch der Vernachlässigung kommen und vererbte Krankheiten und Schwäche, — ja sogar Leiden, die von Vernachlässigung und Mißhandlung herrühren mit sich bringen.

Im Laufe des Jahres wurden 10 Knaben und 4 Mädchen in die Anstalt aufgenommen, und 7 Knaben und 6 Mädchen wurden ihren Angehörigen wieder zugestellt. Obgleich zu Zeiten viel Krankheit unter den Kindern herrschte, sind wir doch vor Schlimmerem bewahrt geblieben, und ist der jetzige Gesundheitszustand ein guter. Es befinden sich augenblicklich in der Anstalt 45 Knaben und 22 Mädchen — also 67 Kinder.

Unter der gewissenhaften und treuen Verwaltung des Superintendenten und seiner Frau wurde den Kindern die bestmögliche Pflege zu teil, die Disziplin der Anstalt gehoben, die geistigen sowie geistlichen Interessen der Kinder wurden gewahrt und das allgemeine Wohl der Anstalt gefördert.

Die finanzielle Lage beider Anstalten auch während dieser schweren Zeiten ist eine solche, die uns zur dankbaren Anerkennung der Vatertroue Gottes auffordert. Der zugesagt, der Vater der Vaterlosen zu sein, war auch in diesem Jahre mit Seiner Gnade bei uns. Auch unserm Superintendenten und Schatz-

meister sagen wir den herzlichsten Dank für den Eifer und die Sorgfalt, womit sie ihr Amt ausgerichtet. In der Schule werden die Waisenkinder täglich in der englischen und deutschen Sprache von 2 fähigen und treuen Lehrerinnen unterrichtet. Den Religionsunterricht im Katechismus und der bibl. Geschichte erteilt seit vorigem Jahre der Pastor der Anstalt. Die Hausandacht wird abwechselnd in deutscher und englischer Sprache gehalten. In der Kapelle des Asyls werden sonntäglich deutsche und englische Gottesdienste gehalten, denen die Kinder und Alte beiwohnen. Den Konfirmanden ist auch dieses Jahr Unterricht erteilt worden. Dieselben werden am Himmelfahrtsfeste konfirmiert.

Im Juni 1893 trat Fr. A. Rott als Stütze der Hausmutter des Waisenhauses ein, und im darauffolgenden Juli Fr. G. Mezenthin als Lehrerin des Kindergartens. Während des vorigen Sommers und bis Ende Februar 1894 erwies Herr P. Mezenthin, Student des theologischen Seminars unserm Heim wertvolle Dienste als Aufseher der Knaben.

Im vergangenen Jahre ließ der Verwaltungsrat die alten schadhafte Heiz-Apparate entfernen und Dampfheizung einführen. Auch Schaukeln und Turngeräte wurden für die Kinder im Hofe angebracht, und der erste Stock des alten Gebäudes zu einer Werkstätte eingerichtet, wodurch es den Knaben ermöglicht ist, ihre freie Zeit nützlich zuzubringen, und zugleich der Superintendent Gelegenheit hat, ihre Fähigkeiten und Neigungen auf diesem Gebiete zu erproben.

Das Asyl.

Die Pflege unserer Alten war ursprünglich mit derjenigen der Kinder verbunden. Im Jahre 1860, am 10. Mai, wurde die erste Frau in das Waisenhaus aufgenommen, um dann später in das eigentliche Asyl überzusiedeln. Das jetzige Gebäude wurde im Jahre 1880 errichtet, und es wurden bis jetzt 125 Personen, 23 Männer und 102 Frauen aufgenommen. Von diesen, die schon alt und gebrechlich zu uns kamen, starben 97, und 24 verließen die Anstalt. Aufgenommen wurden während des vergangenen Jahres 2 Männer und 3 Frauen, so daß sich augenblicklich 28 Personen in der Anstalt befinden. Einige Applikationen um Aufnahme mußten zurückgewiesen werden aus Mangel an Raum. Dieser Umstand veranlaßte den Verwaltungsrat, einen Kontrakt zum Ausbau des 3. Stockwerkes des Hauptgebäudes und des einen Flügels im Asyl einzugehen. Der Raum über der Kapelle wird vorläufig als Schlaßaal der älteren Waisenkinder eingerichtet und für die Alten werden eine Reihe Zimmer im dritten Stock gewonnen, um eine größere Zahl aufnehmen zu können. Voraussichtlich wird alles zum 1. Mai vollendet und zum Gebrauch fertig sein. Bedeutende Verbesserungen wurden auch im Asyl in Bezug auf die Heizung gemacht. Der Gesundheitszustand war kein sehr erfreulicher, wie die Zahl der Toten beweist. Unter der Fürsorge der Matrone, Frau Piehsch, scheinen sich die alten Leute zufrieden und behaglich zu fühlen,

und es wird auch keine Anstrengung gespart, um den Alten, deren Jahre auf Erden nur noch wenige sein können, alles so angenehm wie möglich zu machen.

Die Arbeit und Sorge, welche dem Verwaltungsrat und besonders dem Superintendenten durch die Verantwortung für beide Anstalten auferlegt ist, sind außerordentlich groß. Doch wurden dieselben noch immer unterstützt durch die Besucherinnen, deren Interesse nie nachläßt, deren Bemühungen für die Waisen und Alten unermüdllich ist, und deren Eifer trotz aller Schwierigkeiten und Enttäuschungen, sich in treuer Arbeit für die Insassen der Anstalt beweist. Der wärmste Dank und die höchste Anerkennung sollte unsern so thätigen Frauen gezollt werden.

Obgleich das Einkommen im vergangenen Jahre hinter den Erwartungen zurückblieb, wie es in dieser Zeit der Arbeitslosigkeit nicht anders sein konnte, so haben die verschiedenen Gemeinden doch ihr möglichstes gethan, durch Sendung von Gaben die laufenden Ausgaben zu decken, wofür ihnen hierdurch öffentlich der Dank ausgesprochen sei.

Der Verwaltungsrat gedenkt auch der lieben Freunde in herzlicher Dankbarkeit, welche unsere Anstalten so freundlich in ihrem Testamente bedacht haben. Mit Freude begrüßen wir, daß das Vertrauen in die Leitung unserer Anstalten in den Gemeinden wieder erwacht ist. Wir verweisen auf den Schatzmeistersbericht, in welchem die Vermächtnisse verzeichnet sind und danken den Angehörigen, welche uns freundlichst die Gelder zukommen ließen.

Auch von seiten des Deutschen Hospitals wurde uns bei verschiedenen Gelegenheiten wertvoller Beistand durch erfolgreiche Behandlung einiger Kranken erwiesen. Die Sorgfalt und Aufmerksamkeit, welche unsern Patienten zu teil wurden, verdienen öffentliche Anerkennung.

Unter den Wohlthätern der Anstalt sind noch zu nennen : Dr. Geo. Frieß, 1720 Chestnut Str., Philadelphia, der als Augenarzt im Heim sowohl wie im Alten-Asyl wertvolle Dienste erwies, weder Zeit noch Mühe sparend, den Patienten Erleichterung zu verschaffen ; sowie auch W. H. Staake, Esq., welchem wir zu Dank verpflichtet sind für seinen bereitwilligen Beistand in Sachen, welche gesetzlichen Rat und Leitung erforderten. Beiden Herren spricht der Vorstand hiermit wohlverdienten Dank aus.

Der 8. Juni 1893 war der für den jährlichen Gabentag festgesetzte Tag, und der Erfolg desselben entsprach den Bemühungen der Frauen und der Gemeinden vollkommen. Für den diesjährigen Gabentag wurde der 14. Juni bestimmt. Am 27. April findet die Prüfung der beiden mit der Anstalt verbundenen Schulen statt, und am 29. April, nachmittags 3 Uhr, wird in der englischen St. Johannis-Kirche, Race und 5. Str., Pastor C. C. Sibole, das Jahresfest gefeiert werden.

Wenn wir bedenken, wie Tausende in diesem Winter besonders am Nötigsten Mangel litten, und dann die Lage unserer Alten und Waisen ansehen, mit Allem zum Leben Nötigen, Nahrung, Kleidung, bequem eingerichteten Zimmern zc., versehen, beständige Pflege und gute Erziehung genießend, ohne die geringste Sorge darum tragen zu müssen, haben wir reichlich Ursache, unserm
